WHAT DOES THE TERM 'SHIPWRECK' MEAN

- Has similar meaning to the word 'accident'
- Construct of language that describes effects, errors, faults or mistakes that culminate in a wrecking event
- Describes what we don't know or wish to understand about the event

WHAT IS CULTURAL PRE-DISPOSITION ?

- Describes a process that has been recognised but not clearly defined
- 'Shipwrecks represent general cultural processes of which they were a part prior to wrecking. If natural and cultural processes affecting maritime activities reflect patterned regularities, sites resulting from them will be patterned and will best be interpreted in a wide sociocultural context'

Represents a confluence of cultural and environmental evidence

- CULTURAL FACTORS ASSOCIATED WITH SHIPWRECK
 - Economic factors
 - > Foreign and domestic competition
 - Marine insurance and vessel classification
 - Vessel construction, repairs and maintenance
 - > Equipment, crewing and provisioning

- CULTURAL FACTORS ASSOCIATED WITH SHIPWRECK
 - Technological factors
 - Vessel design and handling
 - Problems with sailing vessels
 - Problems with steam powered vessels
 - Construction materials and techniques

- CULTURAL FACTORS ASSOCIATED WITH SHIPWRECK
 - Hydrographics and navigation
 - Navigation instruments
 - > Charts and sailing directions
 - Lighthouses and navigation aids

- CULTURAL FACTORS ASSOCIATED WITH SHIPWRECK
 - Problems with cargo or vessel employment
 - > Improper loading of vessels
 - > Hazardous cargoes
 - > Risk associated with vessel employment

- CULTURAL FACTORS ASSOCIATED WITH SHIPWRECK
 - O Human factors
 - Incompetency of masters, officers or crew
 - Drunkenness, fatigue and disease
 - Piracy and barratry

ENVINMENTAL FACTORS


- Seasonal weather patterns
- Severe weather events
- Regional geomorphology
- > Tides and currents
- Geomagnetism

THE NORTH-EASTERN AUSTRALIAN REGION

- Coral Sea and the Great Barrier Reef
- Includes 520 shipwrecks 1791 1901
- Detailed wrecking event data for 167
- > 67 % caused by cultural factors
- > 73 % of vessels undermanned
- 68 % wrecked during night time



- Case study: Raine Island Entrance
 - Surveyed in 1844 by Captain Blackwood in HMS Fly
 - Rejected Black Rocks Entrance
 - Constructed Raine Island Beacon
 - Ship trap that claimed 47 vessels
 - Majority of vessels wrecked due to cultural factors
